Department Overview

PIMA COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT



Managed from the Clarence W. Dupnik Sheriff's Complex at 1750 East Benson Highway, the Department serves the citizenry with a community policing philosophy. Geographically, Pima County is the seventh largest county in the nation. The challenge to provide expeditious responses to calls for service has been met through seven strategically placed District Offices surrounding the metropolitan Tucson region. Additional satellite offices are located in Robles Junction, Mt. Lemmon, and Catalina.

The United States Department of Justice (DOJ) recommends the total average ratio of deputies per every 1,000 residents.¹ In Pima County for the population we serve, we should have 2.6 deputies per every thousand residents. Currently, we have 1.1 deputies per 1,000, this is less than half the DOJ recommendation.

ADMINISTRATION



The Administration Bureau is comprised of two divisions: the Community Services Division (CSD) and the Human Resources Division (HRD). The CSD serves as the educational and engagement component for the Department with the community. Engagement encompasses a myriad of resources, including interaction with the media through public information officers, the neighborhood watch program, Sheriff's Auxiliary Volunteers (SAV) program, social media platforms, recruitment fairs, and attendance at various community events and meetings. The division also coordinates Dispose-A-Med and Shred-A-Thon events, during which hundreds of pounds of unused medications and sensitive documents are collected and safely disposed of each year.

The Records Management Section (RMS) is the custodian of all records for the Department and manages the state and county retention schedules for all records. The RMS also responds to all public records requests from the public.

The HRD is responsible for all human resource processes to expand the Department with skilled commissioned, corrections, and civilian staff. The HRD ensures the Department makes ethical, lawful, and policy-driven decisions related to the hiring, management, retention, discipline, and termination of personnel.

Internal Affairs is a section of the Pima County Sheriff's Department Administration Bureau that investigates incidents and possible suspicions of criminal and/or professional misconduct attributed to members of the Department, from commissioned, corrections, and civilian staff.



CORRECTIONS BUREAU



The Corrections Bureau oversees the mandated care, security, supervision, and necessary services for all pretrial detainees housed at the Pima County Adult Detention Complex (PCADC).

The Corrections Bureau is comprised of four divisions: the Administration Division, General Population Housing Division, Health Services Division, and Specialty Housing Division.



The PCADC plays a critical role in Pima County's criminal justice system by securely housing inmates, providing essential services, and supporting rehabilitation efforts. Through coordination with courts, law enforcement, and community partners, PCADC works to balance public safety with humane and effective detention practices.

INTERNAL SERVICES

BUREAU



The Internal Services Bureau oversees a myriad of internal sections for the Department and is comprised of two divisions: the Professional Development and Support Services Divisions.

A critical component of the Internal Services Bureau is the Training Section which is responsible for providing training instruction for corrections officers and ensuring training is compliant with state mandated certification for commissioned personnel.



The Wellness Section supports employees' mental, psychological, and physical health, essential for law enforcement to be effective in keeping

themselves and our community safe.

The Support Services Division is comprised of the Material Management and Facilities Management Sections. The Material Management Section is responsible for ensuring that all physical assets (i.e., fleet, equipment, supplies, and facilities) are transparently acquired, maintained, inventoried, and used efficiently. This section is critical to operational readiness and accountability to the public we serve.

The Facilities Management Section is responsible for ensuring the organization's physical infrastructure functions safely, efficiently, and reliably. Its role extends well beyond basic cleaning and routine maintenance. This section oversees the upkeep of buildings, systems, equipment, and grounds to ensure they remain fully operational and capable of supporting daily operations without disruption.

INVESTIGATIONS BUREAU



The Investigations Bureau is responsible for investigating crimes, collecting evidence, and apprehending suspects. The Investigation Bureau is comprised of two divisions: the Criminal Investigations Divisions (CID) and the Investigative Support Division (ISD):

The CID is a specialized division responsible for conducting in-depth investigations of serious and complex crimes. Investigators gather evidence, interview witnesses, follow leads, and work with prosecutors to identify suspects, build cases, and support the successful prosecution of criminal offenses.

The ISD provides enforcement and intelligence support to internal and external law enforcement partners with special emphasis on disrupting illicit drug smuggling operations.

ISD is also responsible for collecting, receiving, documenting, forensically analyzing, storing and preserving physical evidence from crime scenes by ensuring proper chain of custody, while maintaining evidence integrity for court proceedings.

The ISD, through its Civil Enforcement Unit serves various civil process and court documents, including writs, orders of protection, notices to appear, family/divorce papers, summons/complaints, and subpoenas. The Unit is also responsible for the collection of all delinquent, unsecured personal property taxes in Pima County. The Unit also provides government security for the Pima County Board of Supervisors at their public meetings.

Narcotic Seizures



The Department is committed to regional collaboration to combat narcotics in the Pima County region. As a key partner, the PCSD has detectives and civilian personnel assigned to the Counter Narcotics Alliance (CNA), a federal, state, and local multi-agency task force.

The Department has detectives assigned to the Drug Enforcement Administration, Federal Bureau of Investigations, and Homeland Security Investigations. These detectives assist federal agencies with their investigations in Pima County and detectives serve as a direct link to resources available through the Department.







SUPPORT BUREAU



The Support Bureau consists of the Tactical Support Division which is comprised of five sections as follows:

The Air and Rescue Section provides critical aerial support to enhance public safety across the county and is used on search and rescue missions. Using aircraft equipped with advanced cameras and thermal imaging, the Air Unit assists deputies on the ground by increasing visibility, improving response times, and supporting complex operations.

The Communications Section answers all 9-1-1 calls for service and dispatches deputies. The Communications Section also conducts dispatch academies for the region.

The Tactical Response Section embodies specialized units such as the Bomb Squad, Canine Unit, Mobile Field Force, and SWAT. This section is trained to respond to high-risk and critical incidents, including armed suspects, barricaded subjects, and other situations that exceed routine patrol capabilities. The unit utilizes advanced tactics, equipment, and coordination to protect the public, deputies, and suspects while bringing incidents to a safe resolution.

The Traffic Safety Section (TSS) is comprised of several units: DUI, Motors, Special Enforcement Team (SET), Traffic, and Directed Patrol Central (DPC). This section is responsible for advanced collision and DUI investigations, providing training and enforcement resources to address community traffic safety concerns.

The School Resource Officers (SRO) Unit provides a secure environment in schools and assists in mentoring youth.

★ Innovation & Technology

Technology & Innovation Steering Committee: Over the past year, the Department has implemented a wide array of IT solutions to enhance operational efficiency, data security, and service delivery. Due to the scale and diversity of these initiatives, it is not feasible to detail every solution in this report. However, these efforts collectively demonstrate the Department's commitment to modernization, technological innovation, and continuous improvement in support of our mission and the community we serve.

Axon (Evidence.com) Upgrades: Axon upgraded its evidence.com platform and user experience to meet the growing demands of modern digital evidence management. This update introduced dozens of enhancements, both big and small. The redesign is making Axon digital evidence more intuitive and responsive—so PCSD can work more efficiently and close more cases with better results.

Axon Real Time Crime Center (RTCC): A Real-Time Crime Center (RTCC) platform is a state-of-the-art situational awareness system designed to enhance our agency's ability to respond to critical incidents with greater efficiency and effectiveness. By integrating diverse video sources, including body-worn cameras, fixed CCTV systems, arial footage, and other feeds, into a centralized map-based interface, the platform significantly improves our operational visibility and decision-making. In addition to enhancing in-field awareness by delivering real-time data directly to deputies and detectives, the platform enables coordinated responses across regional jurisdictions during major incidents, natural disasters, and large-scale events. This unified approach strengthens public safety outcomes and promotes interagency cooperation. The Axon contract was submitted to the Board of Supervisors for consideration but was not approved.

Centegix 911 Lanyard Technology: Immediately after the Uvalde school shooting, Sheriff Nanos launched the Active Shooter Response Team, bringing together 14 regional school district superintendents and the region's law enforcement agencies to protect children in their schools. This approach has allowed for consistency in training, needed equipment in schools, emergency notifications, zero tolerance enforcement, and law enforcement responses to active shooters.

In 2025, PCSD joined Centegix and begun the roll out to school district personnel. This system allows for school district personnel to carry a lanyard and with a push of a button rapidly dials 9-1-1, while simultaneously sending notifications to people on-site of the incident for a faster and more effective emergency response.

Snowflake Technologies: Snowflake is an integration project which allows certain datasets to be shared with Tucson Police Department and vice versa. This information assists in data sharing which enhances the Criminal Investigations Division. Snowflake supports Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) compliance requirements, essential for managing sensitive law enforcement data.

Drone Technology: The PCSD has invested and implemented new drone technology over the last several years, and in 2025 we added this technology to the Ajo District Office. These drones have been deployed on multiple occasions and allow us to leverage investigative and patrol law enforcement efforts more effectively.



Overall the PCSD has 107 authorized pilots and drones are being utilized in the patrol, investigations, and all tactical support areas.

LexisNexis® Accurint: This project enhanced our public-facing crime mapping abilities. Members of the community, from any device, display current stats as well as stats for that last five years. In addition, this product allows for improvement in investigations by enhanced cellular phone technology as well as search capabilities.

Cyber Security—Windows 11 Migration: Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS), which is the central hub for the criminal justice information within the FBI, provides a range of state-of-the-art tools and services to state and local law enforcement. In an effort to keep PCSD data technically safe and secure from cyber threats, assessments and compliance are updated each year. PCSD together with Pima County Information Technology Department's completed a re-deployment of department Mobile Device Computers (MDC) for deputies and new computer deployments for all workstations and desktops was undertaken upgrading from Windows 10 or Windows 365 to Windows 11.

DocuSign Software: The implementation of DocuSign has enabled the Department to transition from paper-based forms to an electronic signature workflow that routes documents efficiently through the chain of command. This innovation streamlines internal processes, accelerates approvals, and enhances overall operational efficiency.

Min/Max Inventory Control System: The Material Management Section implemented an inventory control system at all district offices and substations, which has reduced overstocking, and has improved supply efficiency, and unnecessary spending.

★ Infrastructure

San Xavier District Office update: (SXDO): Following a 2021 evaluation of district boundaries and deputy response times, it was determined that a relocation of the SXDO was necessary to better serve the Southwest region of Pima County.

The new SXDO officially opened in May 2025 and is located at 4774 W. Valencia Road, Tucson, Arizona. This was a key milestone in our commitment to community safety and accessibility.



The relocation of the SXDO is more than just a new building; it represents a strategic investment in faster response times and improved service delivery. Public safety remains our top priority, and this project is a testament to our dedication to the residents of Pima County.

Pima County Adult Detention Complex (PCADC): Since 2021, it was found that the age of the jail, combined with severely neglected preventative maintenance from 2017 – 2020, contributed to further deterioration in infrastructure of the jail. Ongoing discussion has been made regarding the status of the PCADC have focused on whether to construct a new facility or pursue substantial renovations. Given that the jail operates continuously, 24/7, year-round, the Department remains committed to providing safe and secure housing for detainees by advancing major maintenance initiatives.

Last year, the PCADC completed a five-year, \$14 million security upgrade, concentrating on camera systems and lock rewiring. This project enhanced overall security by providing improved camera coverage and significantly clearer imaging.

In addition, a \$1.8 million renovation was completed to the kitchen floors and ceiling that fixed the severe leaks to the roof, along with refurbishing equipment. This resulted in more efficient means to delivering over 5,000 meals a day.

Training Center: The Department fabricated and outfitted a new Physical Ability Test (PAT) course to support the physical fitness training and testing requirements for both corrections and commissioned staff. This upgraded course ensures that personnel can train and be evaluated under realistic, and standardized conditions, promoting safety, effectiveness, and readiness.

Additionally, the Department transitioned to Holosun red dot sights for issued weapons. Holosun optics are recognized for its advanced features and competitive price point, enhancing marksmanship training and contributing to increased deputy safety and operational preparedness.

Several improvements were completed throughout the Training Center in 2025, including upgrades to the grounds, infrastructure, equipment, and facility security and access control systems.

Pima Regional Training Center (PRTC) – Shooting Range update: With the high volume of regional usage of the two turning target systems at the regional shooting range, the systems have exhausted their expected service life and the vendor was no longer able to service. In 2025, PCSD replaced the target systems with a newer technology system on range #5

PRTC Facility Security enhancements: The PCSD received some special Grant Funded HIDTA money to apply towards some Pima Regional Training Center improvements for security purposes. These improvements included a 4,214' linear foot of 18" Concertina wire around the entire perimeter fencing. We also added a galvanized 1" security cable wrapped through the entire west end of the fencing for reinforcement purposes. A new rolling gate system which is electronically operated and access will be controlled by a mag card system. The magazine locker has a new security rolling gate shutter along with expanded concrete slab for easier access into the magazine with reinforced metal bollards surrounding the entrance to prevent vehicle access.

PRTC Classroom enhancements: Training classrooms 3 and 4 recently had all audio-visual equipment upgraded replacing the outdated equipment. Both classrooms now have two 75" monitors that are controlled by Multi Touch wall plates and room controllers with cameras and microphones to better assist in lectures during various training.

Material Management Warehouse: The Material Management Section installed a 24/7 security camera system at the Material Management facility, enhancing surveillance, safety, and asset protection.

★ Other

Uniform Patches: The Department developed and implemented new uniform patches to align with the updated departmental classifications established through the County's recent classification and compensation study. The redesigned patches reflect the current organizational structure, enhance clarity in rank, assignment, and support consistency with the County's classification framework.





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
